# Laughter is a serious business, and comedy is a weapon more dangerous than tragedy. Joe Orton

On 9th August 1967, Joe Orton was murdered by his long-time partner, Kenneth Halliwell, who then took his own life. These tragic events brought to a premature end a meteoric career with Orton, author of only three full-length plays, dead at the age of thirty-four.

Following the success of his first major work, Entertaining Mr Sloane, his follow-up, Loot, won the Evening Standard's Best Play award of 1966. The film rights had just been sold for a record sum and he was in the process of writing the film script for the new Beatles' film.

Although his career was cut short, his influence on British post-war theatre was profound, exemplified by the term 'Ortonesque' entering common usage to characterise a scandalous and darkly comedic event or situation.

Loot follows the fortunes of two young criminals, Hal and Dennis. Hal's mother has just died. Having robbed the bank next door to the funeral parlour where Dennis works, and in order to conceal the proceeds of the crime, they hide the money in Hal's mother's coffin. This, however, leaves no room for the body. Their plans are thrown into further chaos when the police arrive in the shape of the psychotic Inspector Truscott.

Orton's macabre masterpiece of black comedy subverts the conventions of popular farce to create a nihilistic, dark, anarchic world which attacks the most entrenched conventions of English society and culture concerning authority, justice, religion and death. Irreverent and iconoclastic, Loot represents Orton at the height of his creative powers.

My hope is that the production may, in some small measure, provide a fitting tribute to a unique talent that was all too quickly extinguished.

# Alistair Lock (McLeavy)

Alistair previously appeared as Hal, thirty or so years ago. Previous roles at the NVT include Barnabus in *The Herbal Bed*, Toomey in *Biloxi Blues* and Hal in *Kvetch*, Offstage, Alistair is perhaps best known for his work on Big Finish Productions' series of officially-licensed *Doctor Who* and *Blake's 7* audio plays, which more than one reviewer described as cinematic. Voice work includes Zen and Orac in *Blake's 7*, Daleks and Cybermen in two video games and other Big Finish audio stories. Film and TV work includes a terrified doctor in the *Wolfman*, and Dennis Nilsen in a TV drama documentary.



# Emmie Spencer (Fay)

Emmies previous NVT roles include Ruth Ellis in *The Thrill of Love*, Incz in *No Exit*, Sophic in *How To Disappear Completely And Never Be Found*, Eunice in *A Streetcar Named Desire* and a variety of roles in *Decade*.



# Frank Leon (Hal)

Frank is a former Anna Scher and Sylvia Young student and he earned a BA in Drama and Playwriting from the University of Greenwich. Frank's roles include Katurian in *The Pillouman*, Max in *Penetrator*, Eugene Morris Jerome in *Biloxi Blues*, Maitre Jaques in *The Miser*. The Waiter in *Celebration*, Billy in *The Rise and Fall of Little Voice*, Brendan in the *Lieutenant of Inishmore* and Magic Arthur in *Better Days*. Frank also directed NVTs production of *Hedwig And The Angry Inch*.

# Steven O'Shea (Director)

Loot marks Steven's fifth directorial production at the NVT following *Speed the Plow* by David Mamet (2011), *Kvetch* by Steven Berkoff (2012), *Old Times* by Harold Pinter (2014) and an adaptation of *Hamlet* by Shakespeare (2015).

Andy has been acting since 2003, predominantly at NVT where he made his stage debut. In recent years he has appeared at NVT as Lenny in Of Mice and Men, Mr Boo in Jim Cartwright's The Rise and Eall of Little Voice, Victor in Arthur Miller's The Price and in various roles in Decade; he has also appeared as Larry in Patrick Marber's Closer for Sideway Theatre, and one half of Jim Cartwright's Two for Shatterproof Productions at the Nightingale and Steven Berkoff's Greek at the Brighton Little Theatre.

Tristan's recent previous performances include in *Twelfth Night* at Brighton Little Theatre, *Crumbs* at the New Venture Theatre and *You'll Do* at the Cast Iron Theatre, He also recently made a brief appearance in BBC One crime drama *Cuffs*.
