

A common tale, a famous tale, in years to come.

Euripides' famous tragedy is a beast I have wanted to tackle for a long while. One of the greatest and most enduring anti-war dramas of all time and the first 'physiological' play of its era, it centres around the power and complexity of its characters, not simply a chain of events. This feels like a very contemporary structure and I was eager to approach it in a contemporary way.

To me, movement is almost indispensable in theatre. The way we use our bodies is much more direct and often more honest than the ways in which we use language: A physical response is much harder to disguise and transform than a verbal one. I have used movement in this piece as an additional or alternative mode of expression to give shape to the women's emotions as they struggle to contain or express their grief. Movement in the context of this particular play also stylizes the action, in a nod to the non-naturalistic manner in which this play would originally have been performed.

I am fairly sure that Euripides would be baffled and probably horrified by the way in which we present this piece! But I hope that you as a twentyfirst century audience can be moved by its newness and boldness, as well as seeing the importance of its message, as penned by Euripides, which is so old and so enduring.

Director Ella Turk-Thompson All action takes place in Troy in the immediate aftermath of the Greek victory. Running time is approximately two hours, including an interval of 15-20 minutes.

Women of Troy in context

Euripides is considered one of the three great writers of ancient Greek tragedy, alongside Aeschylus and Sophocles. He was born around 480 BC and saw the rise of Athenian democracy. *Women of Troy*, one of his nineteen surviving plays, was written in 415 BC.



The city of Troy was located in what is now the east coast of Turkey, and faced Greece across the Aegean Sea.

The Trojan War started when Helen was taken from Greece by the Trojan prince Paris, and the conflict lasted ten years.

Relationship between the characters

The gods

In this setting the gods are real, can be appealed to, and directly intervene in human lives. Poseidon, god of the ocean, built Troy and fought for it. Athene, goddess of wisdom, fought on the Greek side.

The Greeks

Menelaus is king of Sparta; Helen is his wife. Talthybius and his attendant are enacting orders passed down from Agamemnon (king of Argos; Menelaus' brother) and other key Greek commanders.

The Trojan women

Hecuba, queen of Troy, is at the centre of it all. Her sons Paris and Hector were both killed in the war and she waits to hear the fate of her daughters Cassandra and Polyxena. Andromache, who was married to Hector, is Hecuba's daughter-in-law and her son Astyanax is Hecuba's grandson.
