Hysteria

by Terry Johnson

Hysteria is a very rich play, very strong and very strange. There's nothing quite like it – though there are echoes at times of Tom Stoppard's style in masterpieces such as *Travesties*. Historical and hysterical at the same time.

The play made a strong mark at the Royal Court in 1993, reinforced by a revival in the West End three years later. We see Sigmund Freud, the celebrated but imperfect psychoanalyst, mortally ill and tortured by doubt. It's 1938 and the world is going to hell in a handcart, Freud himself having just escaped to London from the growing Nazi onslaught against humanity in general and Jews in particular.

The bold device that Terry Johnson used was to set this grim background of reality alongside two other real events – and very ridiculous events they were too. One was the visit paid to Freud in the summer of 1938 by the highly eccentric surrealist painter Salvador Dali. The other odd event was a trip Freud had recently made to the Aldwych Theatre to see the classic farce *Rookery Nook*. And in *Hysteria* these two things seem to be sparking Freud's imagination in strange directions.

The result is a tide of comic action sweeping the play along, with 'real' reality dissolving into the powerful theatrical reality of farce. Classic farcical ingredients galore – fans of *Rookery Nook* will have a field day spotting the parallels!

Hysteria revels in the magical reality that theatre is able to create. There is a very serious backbone to the narrative – life and death issues, intelligent insights into art and medical ethics, the cry of humanism and the gnawing of self-doubt. But at the same time, the play wants to engage and embrace its audience with a generous mixture of pure fun and entertainment.

It takes a fine dramatist to pull off this kind of balancing act – and needless to say it presents big challenges to performers and members of the production team. We've been having a great time working on it!

Dan Dryer (Sigmund Freud)

Dan trained at the Bristol Old Vic and acted in many roles including a stint in Scarborough for Alan Ayckbourn. Having decided to do a proper job, Dan returned to acting 20 years ago for NVT's Brighton Festival Fringe production, playing Billy Bishop in *Billy Bishop goes to War*. For the last six years Dan has acted and directed in the Barn Theatre in Southwick (for Wick Theatre Company). Recent roles include Goldberg (*The Birthday Party*), Elston Rupp (*Disappeared*), Scoblowski



(Daisy Pulls It Off) and Trofimov (The Cherry Orchard). He has recently directed Thérèse Raquin, God of Carnage and The Tempest. Dan is looking forward to appearing again at NVT after so many years and in such an amazing play.

Stuart Curlett (Salvador Dali)

Hysteria is Stuart's second ever stage performance, both of which have taken place at NVT. His debut was in *Orphans* by Dennis Kelly in November last year, where he played Danny. Stuart wishes to continue the momentum of performing throughout the rest of the year where possible, until October when he will begin a Masters at East 15 Acting School in Essex.



Lucy Mae Knight (Jessica)

This is Lucy's acting debut with New Venture Theatre. With previous experience including Elaine Robinson in Brighton Little Theatre's production of *The Graduate* (2018) and roles in various productions for Drip Action Theatre Company, including the Arundel Festival, Vickie in *The Thrill of Love* (2017) and Woman in *The Father* (2018). As well as theatre work Lucy also has credits in a radio play, murder mysteries and film.


