QUARTET by Ronald Harwood

Ronald Harwood was inspired to write *Quartet* when he watched the documentary film, *Il Bacio di Tosca* (Tosca's Kiss).

The film documents the lives of the residents of Casa di Riposo per Musicisti di Milan, the world's first home for retired opera singers, founded by composer Giuseppe Verdi in 1896.

I was inspired to direct the play by the thought of working with a group of actors and crew of my own generation (apart from our lighting kid, Max). We would rehearse in the mornings, consume copious amounts of tea and biscuits, wallow in shared memories and generally have a jolly good time.

And so it has proved. Rehearing *Quartet* has been the best fun, some of the best fun of my many decades in amateur theatre.

Also, *Quartet* is an intelligent and perceptive play that deals with the question some of us are facing now, and the rest of you will have to contend with in years to come – age.

Harwood says the story is about tolerating old age and not giving into it. In the case of Jean, Reggie, Cecily and Wilf, once the applause from their iconic Covent Garden performance in 1971 has died away and the fame is a distant memory, what do these fading stars have to live for?

In a recent interview with TheArtsDesk.com, the author said: "I know more of actors than old opera singers but performers are performers. The terrible thing about an opera singer is that the career is short because the voice goes."

Talking of careers, after many years acting in and directing shows across Brighton and Hove, this is my NVT directorial debut, and once I had got to grips with the 'way we do things' it has been an extremely pleasurable experience.

And I love the bricks and mortar. I feel a real buzz every time I unlock the door, disengage the alarm and walk into the building. There's a tremendous sense of theatre history. Hopefully, before I am too old, I may be invited back.



Raymond Tongue (Reginald)

It was some twenty years back that Ray first trod the boards of NVT in Arthur Miller's *The American Clock*; he subsequently played in *The Misanthrope* and *Curtains* before work took him away from Brighton. A somewhat circuitous route – Eastbourne, Cardiff, Worthing and Exmouth – and Ray finds himself back in Brighton and on the NVT stage, a naturally tone-deaf man playing a retired opera singer. Much has changed in that time; a director's note "Act your age" now has new meaning.



John Hartnett (Wilf)

Quartet marks John's acting debut at NVT although he has been a member for 10 years. He has worked under Richard Lindfield's direction before in When The Wind Blows and No Man's Land at Brighton Little Theatre and they were both in the cast of Other People's Money. John has appeared in numerous productions at BLT, notably Duet For One, The Playboy of the Western World and as Alan Bennet in The Lady in the Van. More recently he has appeared in Haunting Julia and Loving Androids at Lewes Little Theatre.



Ann Atkins (Cecily)

Ann is a newcomer to NVT. In 2002 she emigrated from Cheshire to Henfield and immediately joined two theatre companies, Brighton Theatre Group and Brighton Little Theatre. Past musicals with BTG include Oliver, My Fair Lady, The Full Monty and most recently Bad Girls. BLT shows include The Lady in the Van (with her current co-star John), A Little Night Music, Love Song and The Mill On The Floss. Ann has directed Bedroom Farce, Absurd Person Singular, The Graduate and The Thrill of Love at the Little. And now, it's 'Old Lady Time'. Enjoy.



Carol Croft (Angelique)

Having been part of the stage management team since joining NVT in 2018 (she recently worked on Mark Wilson's *Talk*), Carol is delighted to be given the opportunity to step, or rather stride, into the spotlight. Her departure from backstage sees her play care home assistant Angelique amongst what she says in 'an esteemed cast'.



Sheelagh Baker (Jean)

Sheelagh is a long-standing actor with NVT, having appeared in over 50 productions, with a wide range of roles from farce to Shakespeare and comedy to drama. These have included some challenging, some favourite roles, some disappointments and the odd award along the way. Now? Sheelagh is continuing with her acting commitments outside of NVT, but so happy to be still involved with the company and revelling in the energy and talent of our new members.

Samantha Brennan (Opera Singer)

Sam originally studied at Trinity College of Music and the University of Sussex. Her credits include leading roles in Berkoff's Sink the Belgrano, Orton's Loot and Lorca's The House of Bernardo Alba as well as Fiddler on the Roof, Anything Goes, Showboat and South Pacific. More recently, she performed at the Trinity Theatre in Tunbridge Wells as the title character in An Evening with Lady Montague. She has also sung as alto soloist in Rachmaninoff's Vespers and Vivaldi's Gloria. Sam also performs with the Brighton-based jazz quintet Unfenced.

Gary Nock (Accompanist)

Over the years Gary has performed locally in musical theatre, operetta and opera in addition to being musical director for so many musicals he has now stopped counting. It has been a pleasure spending time with Sam and Sally as they decided upon options to sing for this production of *Quartet*. A memory: the only time Gary has been on stage at the New Venture Theatre before was back in the late 1980s when he was an extra in a production of *Bent* in which Richard Lindfield played the role of Max.

Sally Wilson (Opera Singer)

Originally from South Wales, Sally trained at the Royal College of Music. Living in Brighton, Sally performs regularly as both soloist and ensemble singer. She has played a variety of leading and supporting roles with Heber Opera, most recently singing Priestess Leila in *The Pearl Fishers*. Other roles include: Fenena (Nabucco), Zerlina (Don Giovanni), Micaela (Carmen), and Pamina (The Magic Flute). Sally also performs with the Brighton-based jazz quintet Unfenced – the group will be taking part in the Brighton Festival Fringe on 2nd May 2020.




